

The Pearl Talks -- Thirteen Amazing Years

Thirteen years ago my husband and I made the big change from house ownership to loft ownership. The Pearl District had always been one of our favorite places to visit. We'd start at Giant Steps - only the best independent coffee shop in the city – and then on to the local galleries, many no longer with us Jamison Thomas and Quartersaw galleries, to name two of my favorites.

I remember driving my parents to see our warehouse in transition. My mother looked at the Palace Gallery - located where MacKenzie Lofts stands today – and seeing young artists and street kids lounging on the outdoor theatre seats, proceeded to tell us we were crazy. We weren't going to deny she might be partly correct, but nonetheless, we were

Soon we began attending the District Neighborhood Pearl Association Board meetings. Back then, reflecting the neighborhood, their were more business owners than residents on the Board. At these meetings, we met the early pioneers who came to the Pearl with a vision – Al Solheim, Neilson Abeel, Wilbur Larson and Carol Smith-Larson.

We sat and listened to the plans for the future and the hurdles to be cleared to achieve those goals. Within a few short months, I was asked to sit on the Board. I eagerly accepted.

Although I was very interested in the physical growth of the neighborhood, I was even more interested in its livability. then, the Pearl had many homeless people, drunks, and drug dealers. We had our foot patrol – our own sort of community policing – on the theory our presence in the neighborhood would show these individuals we lived here and cared about what was happening on our streets.

We walked the North Park blocks in Pearl District vests, picking up trash (there were no garbage cans in the district at that time). We carried a portable phone and called police when we saw illegal activity, or CHIERS when a drunk was endangering his life by falling asleep in the street.

Next the Neighborhood Association bought garbage cans at the local Winks Hardware, along with chains and padlocks to secure them and went off to look for sponsors to empty them. When sponsors were found – Giant Steps and a couple galleries – I padlocked the cans to nearby light poles. Now there were receptables for the coffee cups and doggie waste bags.

And the Pearl grew. Abandoned buildings, drunks and drug dealers, gave way to new construction. After many hours and a lot of hard work by another one of our residents, Donna Drummond, the city replaced our portable trashcans with their own trash receptacles.

We continued the "Pearl Party" tradition. Our 10th anniversary party was one of the biggest yet Pearl restaurants and businesses contributed its to success. Community involvement was huge.

Last month we held our 17th annual Pearl Party. Attendence has tripled, and community involvement is stronger than ever. I organized the 10-year party pretty much on my own. This year, board member and organizer Carter Case needed more than a dozen people to help him. Carter and every one of his helpers put in countless hours to make this the most successful party ever.

These are just a few of the changes we long-time Pearl residents have seen. And, although the landscape has changed, the need for community involvement has not.

There is still a lot of land to develop and projects in the works – The Fields (the large community park north of Tanner Creek), Centennial Mills, the main post office on Hoyt, and the list goes on.

These proposed projects will change the landscape for generations to come. In the past, there were not that many of us, and we all dug in and worked hard. Today we have thousands of new residents, but we still need neighbors who care about livability and continued growth of the Pearl to get involved in the neighborhood association. more involvement we get, the less

I am amazed by the changes over the 13 years I've lived here. And I know the Pearl District would not look like it does today without the hard work of those early pioneers and the many hours they devoted to its growth and livability. It took a lot of work. And we still need people to carry on the work of the those pioneers. Step to the plate. Get involved. Help make the next 13 years even more rewarding
